## Course Registration 2014-2015

As previously communicated, LUC has made a number of changes to the academic programme of 2014-2015. Please note that returning students (Classes 2013-2016) will not be adversely affected by these changes and that you will be able to graduate in your chosen major. The academic requirements have not changed for returning students. Several course titles have changed, some courses have been removed, and other courses have been added. But this is nothing new compared to previous years.

An important change is that LUC has largely done away with the cross-tagging of courses. This means that courses that were previously shared between two or more majors will now reside solely within a single major. There are a few exceptions; for example, several methods courses are still cross-tagged and a few tracks are shared between different majors and minors. The removal of cross-tags has an important benefit for students: they will no longer have to compete for seats in their major's courses against students from other majors.

Information on specific courses has been published in the [e-Prospectus of 2014-2015](#). Please note that at this stage, only the course outlines of Semester 1 courses have been released; Semester 2 courses are listed in the e-Prospectus, but their outlines will be published closer to December, when students will register for Semester 2 classes. Returning students will also notice that the course descriptions have been published on the pages of the *new* Majors and Minors. This was done to keep the e-Prospectus as straightforward as possible. It has been explained [here](#), but in short:

**Global Justice** students will find their courses on the page of the [International Justice](#) major;

**Global Public Health** students will find their courses on the page of the [Global Public Health](#) major;

**Human Interaction** students will find their courses on the page of the [Human Diversity](#) major;

**International Development** students will find their courses on the page of the new [Governance, Economics, and Development](#) major;

**Policy Science** students will find their courses on the page of the new [Governance, Economics, and Development](#) major;

**Political Arts** students will find their courses on the page of the page of the new [Human Diversity](#) major, but should also have a look at the notes with the Human Diversity major overview below;

**Sustainability** students will find their courses on the page of the new [Earth, Energy, and Sustainability](#) major;

**World Politics** students will find their courses on the page of the [World Politics](#) major.

With regard to the [minors](#):

**Economics** students will find their courses on the page of the new [Governance, Economics, and Development](#) major;

**Entrepreneurship** has been renamed to [Business & Entrepreneurship](#);

**Gender & Women's Studies** has been renamed to [Gender Studies](#);

Journalism students will find their courses [here](#);

**Rhetoric & Argumentation** has been discontinued in 2014-2015; however, its more popular courses have been included in the [Languages](#) minor, allowing students to still complete their minor in Rhetoric & Argumentation;

**Psychology** students will find their courses [here](#).

Be assured that the tags for courses you took in previous years will remain valid, even if those tags they have changed in 2014-2015. As previously communicated, while the new and old majors share their courses, returning students will *not* be able to graduate in the new majors.

Students should keep the following things in mind when selecting their courses:

1. Course registration opens on 18 July and closes on 3 August, end of day. Students will find the link to the registration survey in the email they will receive from the Curriculum Coordinator on 18 July. Registration is *not* based on a "first come, first serve"-principle; a student submitting his/her preferred courses on 19 July will *not* have a better chance of getting into those courses than a student who submits his/her preferences on 2 August.
2. Students should carefully review the available courses from the standpoint of their study plan, as well as the specific requirements and notes for each major and minor (see below).
3. In the course registration survey, students will be asked to submit their top six preferred courses per block.
4. Students should always prioritize courses that count towards their graduation requirements. This includes a total of 180 EC across the following four components of your programme:

**Major: 80 EC**

- 20 EC in 300-level courses (four courses), one integrative course to be identified by the student and his/her tutor;
- 10 EC (minimum, depends on major) in 200-level methods courses;
- 30 EC in a combination of 100/200/300-level courses within the major;
- 10 EC in Capstone;
- 10 EC in electives, ideally related to the major.

**Minor or Electives: 30 EC**

- usually six 5 EC courses;
- if students choose to do a minor, at least 10 EC should be at the 300-level.

**Global Citizenship: 25 EC**

- the 2014-2015 courses tagged with Global Citizenship have been published [here](#).

**Compulsory first-year courses: 45 EC**

- for returning students, these courses are: four Global Challenges courses, Academic Writing, History of Philosophy, Numeracy, and Designing Academic Inquiry, and Area Studies;
- if students failed or more of these classes, they should look at page 21 to find out which of the new courses they will need to take as replacement.

5. After course registration closes on 3 August, the students course preferences will be used to execute the course allocation process. Students will receive an overview of their allocated courses in the week of 11-15 August.

## Some final notes:

- Students should review the prerequisites of the courses they want to enroll in; the prerequisites have been listed in the courses outlines;
- Students working towards a BSc degree require 85 EC of BSc courses, of which 20 EC is accumulated during the first-year programme;
- Students who first enrolled in the LUC programme in February 2014 should have a look on page 21 to find out in which compulsory classes they will need to enroll in Semester 1, 2014-2015;
- Students who first enrolled in the LUC programme in September 2013 and failed compulsory first-year courses should have a look on page 21 to find out in which compulsory classes they will need to enroll in Semester 1, 2014-2015.

Students should ideally discuss issues related to their study plan with their tutors. If they are unable to contact their tutor over the summer break, and have urgent questions about the curriculum, they may contact the Curriculum Coordinator ([course.administration@luc.leidenuniv.nl](mailto:course.administration@luc.leidenuniv.nl)).

### **Registration**

Please note that this minor is limited to the autumn semester of year three, and in principle is limited to BSc students. Because the minor is full time (and intense) students may only be enrolled in courses at TU Delft during the semester. This has important consequences for study planning and graduation requirements. Students intending to enroll in a TU Delft minor *must* take care that they do not require important LUC course requirements for their study plan that are only offered in the autumn semester.
